We have the highest expectation that this celebration will be fulfilling with the promise to be memorable and festive to mark Denair School's Centennial.

Edward E. Parraz District Superintendent



Edward E. Parraz was born and raised in the Visalia/Exeter area of Tulare County. He graduated from Exeter Union High School in 1971 and went on to Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Poultry Industry in 1976. He continued his education at Cal State, Fresno where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Education in 1978, as well as, receiving his teaching credential in vocational agricultural education. Mr. Parraz first began teaching agriculture at Hughson High School in 1979. During his tenure with Hughson, Mr. Parraz continued his education with the University of San Francisco earning his Master of Arts in Educational Administration and administrative services credential in 1984. From 1984 to 1986, Mr. Parraz took another agriculture teaching position with Modesto High School.

Having a new career interest in public school administration, Mr. Parraz was hired as principal for Hilmar High School from 1986 to 1989. Leaving Hilmar, his administrative career in education continued the next seven years with Modesto City Schools, where he served as assistant principal of pupil personnel at Grace Davis High School, principal at Mark Twain Junior High School, and Director of Vocational Education. In 1996, Mr. Parraz left Modesto returning to his hometown to accept a position as Director of Middle Schools with Visalia Unified School District. While with Visalia Unified, Mr. Parraz also served as Director of Student Services and Area Administrator for Grades 7-12/Adult.

On July 30, 2000, Mr. Parraz was given an opportunity to serve as Interim Superintendent for Denair Unified School District. Mr. Parraz was hired later that year as District Superintendent for the District.

## DENAIR SCHOOLS THROUGH THE DECADES

In 1897, John T. Davis owned the 160-acre townsite of Denair. The site was surveyed and recorded with the name Elmdale. Therefore, the first school was established as Elmdale School.

#### 1900'2

1902 Mr. Davis deeded 15 lots to the Elmdale School District. A one-room schoolhouse built on the



west side of Gratton Road opened with one teacher and five students. Arletta Scott was the first teacher. The students included Harry, Hazel, and Leslie De La Mater, and Jack and Mary Pickford. On Sundays the schoolhouse was used for the *Christian Church*. In 1907 the school became the full-time *Christian Church* as a new two-story schoolhouse was built across the street. Presently, the *Church of Christ* occupies the site of the first one-room school house.

- 1904 The name of the town was changed from Elmdale to Elmwood.
- 1907 The name of the town was changed from Elmwood to **Denair**. John Denair was a former Santa Fe Railroad employee, and he established the Denair Land and Development Co.
- 1907 **Denair Grammar School**, a two-story, wood-framed school, was constructed near Gratton Road across from the original one-room schoolhouse and at the present site of Denair Volunteer Fire Department.

Prior to 1912, high school students from Denair attended Turlock High School. The first Turlock High was completed in 1907 and located at Laurel and High Streets in Turlock which is the present-day site of Turlock Covenant Church.

#### 1910'2

1912 **Denair Union High School** was established as a result of an election June 1912. The second story

of the old *Bank Building* located at the corner of Main and San Joaquin Streets began with 26 students and two teachers. The first floor of the *Bank Building* included a bank, library, drug store, grocery store, meat market, post office and barbershop. The first class of four students graduated in 1915, and the last class graduated in 1921. Mr. W.O. Larson graduated in 1920; and in later years, served on the school board from 1935-1957. The *Bank Building* was built in 1910 and torn down in 1981.

1912 The *Little Red Schoolhouse* was a one-room school for First Grade built near the corner of Zeering



Road and Alameda Street slightly south of the current Denair Senior Center (rock building). The *Little Red Schoolhouse* was last used in 1949.

- 1916 The two-story grammar school built in 1907 was destroyed by fire. For close to two years, classes were held in the old one-room school (which later became the Christian Church), the Friends Church and temporary buildings.
- 1916 In May, an election was defeated for the sale of fifteen \$1,000 bonds payable in gold coin for the purpose of purchasing lots of land for a high school site and building. In June, a second election also did not receive a 2/3 majority vote for the sale of ten \$1,000 bonds for a high school site and building.
- 1916 An inspector for the State High School Association said that **Denair Union High School** was *the best of its size in the state*.
- 1917 In February 1917, a **\$28,000 bond measure** was passed for the construction of a new grammar school. There were 280 votes cast with 211 votes in favor.

1918 The new **Denair Grammar School** was completed. The brick building was constructed slightly



south of the burned-down school on Gratton Road. During the late 1950's, the attached north and south classrooms and interior corridors and the tankhouse from the original two-story grammar school were torn down. The auditorium portion remained and is currently the *Gaslight Theater*.

#### 1920'2

1921 **Denair Union High School** was constructed of bricks and was located at Hawthorne and Fresno Streets. A \$40,000 bond measure was passed in 1920 to support the cost of building the new high school. The first graduating class of eight students graduated June 1922.

1925 The **first cafeteria** for the grammar school was organized by the PTA and Home Department of Farm Bureau. The cafeteria was closed for several years during the depression era and reopened in 1943 with the assistance of a government subsidy program.

1927 The first gymnasium was constructed at Hawthorne and Madera Streets at a cost of \$4,000 and



resembled a large hay barn. The building to the east of the gym was the boys' shop building. The shop building was later moved to Lester Road and currently serves as the Bus Shed. The structures to the west of the gym included the shower house and pump house.

1930'2

1939 The first school bus was purchased, and two teachers alternated driving the bus route.

1940's

1940 The grammar school auditorium was remodeled.

Dressing rooms were added to the structure and the front was architecturely changed from rounded arches to square-shaped window and door openings.

1942 The Denair Grammar School and Denair Union High School Districts unified and became **Denair Unified School District.** Denair was the first unified district in Stanislaus County. Mr. Thomas E. Simms was hired as the first Superintendent.

1942 Montpellier Union School District (one-room school approximately 7 miles east of Denair) was

annexed to the Denair School District. The Union School was last used as a school in 1940. The school district sold the lot and school for \$27,500 for a private residence in 1998. Between 1875 and 1940 a total of four, one-room schoolhouses in slightly different locations served the Montpellier area and each school was an improvement from the previous school.

1946 Denair High School's **first football team** was formed, and the team played their first season.



1947 Mr. Jack W. Lytton was hired as a teacher and coach for Denair High School. His tenure at the

high school included 27 years—six years as a teacher, six years as a counselor and fifteen years as principal. He retired in 1974.

- The school district purchased a site for a new elementary school at Hawthorne and Madera Streets.
- 1949 The first four classrooms (one wing) were completed at the new **Denair Elementary School.**

The first class moved to the new school January 1950. The roof's architectural style was "butterfly."

#### 1950'2

- The second four classrooms (one wing) and an administrative office were completed at **Denair Elementary School**. The roofs retained the "butterfly" style. The administrative office currently serves as the Technology Office.
- The **new gymnasium** was constructed to replace the gym built in 1927. The east side of the gym (weight room) was used as a cafeteria until the new cafeteria, *Larson Hall*, was built.

- The High School **Agriculture and Shop building** was constructed. The building is currently used by the Maintenance & Operations Department. The multipurpose building, **Larson Hall**, was finished and named in honor of school board member Mr. W.O. Larson who served on the school board for 22 years (1935-57). The third classroom wing was added to the elementary school.
- 1959 The District purchased 40 acres from the descendents of John N. Lester on the west side of Lester Road for a new high school site

In the early 60's, high school dances were held for the first time, and the *Be-Bop Dance Club* was formed. The school dances were held in *Larson Hall*.

1963 The **Thomas E. Simms Science Building** for the high school was constructed. The science building is currently a classroom wing of Denair Middle School.

**Mr. Thomas E. Simms** served the District for 29 years (1937-1966) first as a high school math and science teacher and as a bus driver. He then served as the high school principal and concluded his profession as the superintendent. He was the first superintendent of Denair Unified School District.

- 1969 The new **Denair High School** at Lester Road opened. The school began with one main building which included the office, library and classrooms and one portable classroom. The roof is a wood shake, *mansard* style.
- 1969 **Denair Junior High** (seventh and eighth grades) first began at the red brick high school when the high school students entered the new high school facility.

#### 1970's

The **Automotive/Welding Shop** building and a second classroom building with stage area were added to the high school.

1974 The new **Denair Middle School** was completed

1975 The red brick high school structure built in 1921 was torn down.

- 1975 The Ag Department began the development of the school farm including livestock pens. During the next five years, the school farm expanded with other structures. Beginning in 1962, Ag students had the opportunity to learn by doing with various projects and training involving the 40-acre high school site as well as the additional 20 acres acquired in 1976.
- 1976 The district purchased 20 acres north of the new high school from Mrs. Hollingsworth, and the property is currently utilized by the high school Ag Department for crops. During the 1975-76 school year, student population increased by almost 14% for a total of 912 students in the district.

#### 1980'2

The early 80's marked the beginning of the **computer revolution** in Denair Schools. Each school site had a few computers including Apple II's, Radio Shack TRS-80's and early IBM PC's.

During the early 80's the Denair Lions Club, community members and school worked together to prepare three **baseball diamonds** with backstops for the hgh school. Old football bleachers were renovated and converted into bleachers for baseball/softball fans.

- 1986 The school district office was moved from the elementary school site to the Lester Road site.
- 1987 The **first computer lab** of 28 Apple IIe's was established at Denair Middle School.

#### 1990's

1991 Mr. Alex Marshall was hired as principal of the high school. He served for eight years as principal and one year as high school and middle school principal. He has also served as director of curriculum and of educational services. Mr. Marshall currently serves as Director of Alternative Education that includes summer school, Denair Charter Academy and adult education. He has served the community for the past ten years as a volunteer fireman with EMT certification.

I am very fortunate to be a school administrator in a community where there are staff, students and parents who are supportive of the school's efforts to enhance education. - 1993-95 Denair Adult School held evening classes at Denair High School.
- 1996 The Music Department re-established a marching band.
- The district developed a **school logo** that is used on agendas, signs and various forms of written communication. The survalley that are often so beautiful and want to give our students. The water through our valley. The canal is a representation of future thinking far beyond ourselves.

Thus, as we make decisions in our district, we want to include long-term planning and thinking that will effect our students far into the future. - 1996-97 A district-wide **computer network** was installed providing internet service and email as well as integrated business services and instructional capabilities. A **website** for the district was established. District communication was also enhanced with the installation of a PBX phone system which provided a telephone in every classroom and work area.
- 1997-98 Two new relocatables were purchased for the **Agriculture Department** so that the

- classrooms could be located on the high school campus rather than on the east side of Lester Road. One year later a potting shed was added for the Ag Department.
- The name Denair Middle School was dropped when the District reconfigured Denair Elementary to include kindergarten through eighth grades. A new relocatable building was purchased for the elementary school office and located between the elementary and middle schools.
- A new relocatable building was purchased for the expanding **Music Department**, and **new uniforms** were purchased for the marching band.
- 1998-99 New **playground equipment** for grades 1-5 was provided by funds from Denair Parents' Service Club. In 2001 and 2002, new playground equipment was added to the preschool and kindergarten playgrounds.

1999-00 **Class-size reduction** was implemented for grades kindergarten, first and second. This policy stated no more than 20 students per classroom. Class-size reduction for third grade was implemented the following year.

#### 2000's

- The District reconfigured to include Denair Elementary (K-4) and Denair Middle School (5-8) each with their own principal.
- 2000 **Mrs. Michelle Bettencourt Bush** was hired as Principal of the Middle School. Her first teaching job was at the middle school when she was hired in 1991. She served as a sixth grade teacher from 1991-2000 and was subsequently hired as the principal.

I will never forget having to teach our own PE classes and having to share all the PE equipment among staff...what great teamwork we demonstrated to our students!

2000 **Mr. Gary L. Jones** was hired as Principal of the Elementary School. His first teaching job was at the elementary school when he was hired in 1976. From 1976-1984, Mr. Jones served as a fifth grade teacher, eighth grade teacher, GATE teacher and as a resource specialist for curriculum. He taught for several years in American schools overseas and returned to Hughson Elementary as principal for three years. He then served as principal of Crowell Elementary in Turlock for three years prior to becoming principal of Denair Elementary.

## 2001 School District Accomplishments

The Denair Unified School **District Strategic Plan** was developed. The strategic plan incorporates the district's Mission Statement and Belief Statement with six strategic components which provide a road map and guide the district toward the pursuit of educational excellence. The powerful Belief Statement links collaboration of parents, community and district to ensure that every student will come to school, stay in school and do the very best they can. The six strategies include student achievement, quality teachers and instruction, parent and community involvement, technological advancements, facilities and budget process.

A modular building for the "new" District Office was established slightly west of the older



relocatable structure and nearer Lester Road. The district office provides administrative and business services for the unified district including the superintendent's and business manager's offices. Business services in this office include accounts payable and receivable, budgeting, payroll and personnel.

The **Denair Charter Academy** was established to provide alternative education for K-12th grade students. The school provides an independent study and a home-schooling program and distance learning opportunities based on students' individual learning styles and needs. The curriculum focuses on core knowledge in each subject area. Students receive a strong foundation of basic skills and an opportunity for advanced courses and electives. The first twelfth-grade graduation of ten charter

students occurred June 5, 2001. Currently, Denair Charter Academy has an enrollment of over 130 students.

**Student Conduct Codes** for grades K-5 and 6-12 were approved to provide the structure for rights and responsibilities of students, parents and the school district. The Codes also state student behavior expectations and consequences.

The elementary school reconfigured to grades K-5; the middle school to grades 6-8. Both schools adopted a trimester calendar for the purpose of curriculum, instruction and assessments.

At the high school level, the **Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID)** program was implemented to support curricular and positive reinforcement needs of students.

**Character Counts** was implemented to provide a district-wide **character education** program. Students are reminded by a variety of curricular and instructional strategies to demonstrate *caring, citizenship, fairness, respect, responsibility and trustworthiness* at school, home and in the community.

**September 11, 2001**, brought the nation a tragic event at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. The students and staff of our district united with renewed patriotism.

**Collaborative Days** were instituted for the high school staff. The staff members articulate and collaborate regarding curricular, instructional and assessment strategies that are designed to better serve the high school student.

**Surveillance systems** were approved and installed at strategic locations on campuses to provide safety and security.

In the November 6, 2001, election the school district passed an **\$8.2 million General Obligation Bond**. The bond campaign received outstanding parent and community support which resulted in an 81.9% affirmative vote on **Measure "P."** The GO Bond also provided matching funds for our modernization projects throughout the district.

The **Future Facilities Advisory Committee (FFAC)** consisting of district personnel, community members and district architects was formed to provide input and to facilitate the progress of bond-supported and other construction projects in the district.

Denair High School was selected as a **Digital California Project Demonstration Site**.

2002 School District Accomplishments

The **Denair Elementary State Preschool** started in January 2002. We now have two classes each serving 22 students. Enrollment includes 3 and 4-year old preschool children from low income families. They are involved in readiness activities that will enable them to enter kindergarten with the skills required to be successful in school.

**Coyote Walkway** and a fence were approved and installed which provided a well-lighted and safe walkway area between the high school site, cafeteria, elementary and middle school campuses and gym.

Two portable classrooms from the high school campus were moved to the proximity of the District Office and Maintenance/Operations building for the use of the Denair Charter Academy.

The May 9, 2002, groundbreaking ceremony for the new high school gym complex marked the celebration for the successful bond election and provided an opportunity to once again thank the Denair community for their support on Measure "P."

The **elementary school office** was relocated slightly north of the technology office and near Madera Street for improved accessibility and visibility.

Portable classrooms from the high school were relocated to the elementary school campus for additional classroom space.

**Mr. Gerald Savelson** was hired as principal of Denair High School. He worked in business management positions for several years prior to entering the teaching profession. He served as a business teacher, department chairman and coach at Turlock High School for thirteen years. He also served as assistant principal at Linden High School for one year prior to Denair.

With the projected growth and all of the new construction, it is an exciting time to be at Denair High School. **Gerald Savelson**, High School Principal

A **lunch shelter** in the quad area of the high school was completed in August and hot lunches from the school cafeteria are available for high school students and staff.

An existing business education classroom was renovated to serve as two **special education classrooms** at the high school.

The **high school parking lot** was expanded and new asphalt and striping were completed to provide additional parking for students and staff.

**Denair Elementary School** has a long tradition of excellence! Our students continue to score at or above average on national measures of student achievement. Our curriculum is continually reviewed and aligned with the State curriculum standards. One hundred percent of our staff is fully credentialed according to the teaching standards established by the State of California with state curriculum standards. Test scores for elementary students are at or above the national average on standardized tests.

Positive Leisure Activities for Youth (PLAY) is an **after school care program** provided at Denair Elementary through the Turlock Recreation Department. Approximately 40 students participate and obtain homework assistance or have the opportunity to do crafts, sports and other recreational activities.

**Denair Middle School** is an exceptional place of learning and has established standards that focus on the essential skills of math, reading and language arts while maintaining a curricular balance of technology and the fine arts. Textbooks are aligned to state standards. The middle school students continue to show excellent academic growth on all performance scores according to SAT 9 testing. Denair Middle School was the first school in the district to use the Accelerated Reader Program as a supplemental reading program in 1998.

**Denair High School** continues to offer a strong and comprehensive academic, vocational and fine arts secondary education. Many extra-curricular activities provide opportunities for student involvement. The faculty is working in conjunction with Stanislaus County Office of Education (SCOE) School Support Network. Through this collaborative effort, there has been demonstrated improvement of student performance on standardized tests. Textbooks are aligned to the California Content Standards and Science Research Associates (SRA) reading has been introduced.

In the area of **technology**, the district has over 400 computers for classroom and administrative use. There are three computer labs and three wireless laptop carts in the district. The middle school and high school offer computer literacy classes and computer application courses. All school sites offer specialized curriculum software for various courses.

In the area of **library services**, each school has a library facility. Beginning in February 2000 the library became automated and each book has been electronically catalogued. The catalogues are also available on the internet. The elementary school library currently houses close to 9,300 books; the middle school library, 4,000 books; and the high school library, 4,900 books. The libraries serve approximately 1,500 patrons including students, staff and parents. Future plans for the libraries include a library media center for the high school and the combining of the elementary and middle school libraries into a new building.

The new **cafeteria kitchen** was completed for the opening of school after an almost two-year delay due to Department of the State Architect (DSA) findings. The renovation included a new kitchen and food preparation area. The students enjoy the efficiency of a speed line with a variety of selections. A breakfast program is also available beginning at 7:30 a.m. The program is popular with students and parents. More than 600 meals are served on a daily basis.

The **Transportation Department** currently operates five school buses and two vans. Three bus routes in the morning and three routes in the afternoon cover approximately 33,000 miles a year for home to school transportation. In addition, the district maintains five pickup trucks, a one-ton truck, a tractor and two riding lawnmowers.

The Denair Unified School District currently operates with an approximate \$9.2 million **budget**. Current **attendance** for the district at the four educational sites (elementary school, middle school, high school and charter academy) is approximately 1,300 students. The **teaching staff** includes 33 teachers for preschool-5th grades; 16 teachers for 6-8th grades; and 22 teachers for 9-12th grades. In addition, **support staff** is provided in the areas of instructional aides, secretarial, computer technician, food services, maintenance, transportation, and campus supervisors. Current support staff includes 34 full-time and 31 part-time employees. There are approximately 50 positions in the district ranging from athletic coaches to FFA to prom to yearbook advisors that receive stipends for specific assignments.

On **October 15, 2002**, heavy equipment began moving dirt for the first phase of the gym and multi-purpose complex at the high school site.

On **October 26, 2002**, the Denair Unified School District and the community of Denair joined in *Celebrating 100 years (1902-2002) of Educational Excellence*. Curriculum, construction, and community describe the direction of our district for the new century. Improving student attendance, performance, and assessments continue to be our focus and every site has been making notable gains in these areas.
